

**REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING
OF THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BROOK PARK, OHIO
HELD ON MAY 5, 2020.**

The meeting was called to order by Council President Vecchio at 7:30 p.m., the clerk called the roll and the following Members of Council answered:

SCOTT, SCHMUCK, ORCUTT, TROYER, MENCINI, POINDEXTER, SALVATORE

Also in attendance were Mayor Gammella, Law Director Horvath and Finance Director Cingle.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF PRECEDING MEETINGS:

1. Special Caucus Meeting held on April 13, 2020.

Motion by Mr. Mencini, supported by Mr. Poindexter, to approve as printed.

ROLL CALL: **AYES:** Mencini, Poindexter, Salvatore, Troyer, Orcutt, Schmuck, Scott.

NAYS: None. The motion carried.

REPORTS FROM STANDING COMMITTEES:

Aviation & Environmental Committee – Chairwoman, Schmuck

Mrs. Schmuck reported the Aviation & Environmental committee has nothing on tonight's agenda. Wished Happy Nurse week to all Nurses as well as Firefighter appreciation day' both jobs are critical thinking and physical. Thank you for all he skills as well as everything you do.

Finance Committee - Chairman, Scott:

Mr. Scott reported the Finance committee has two items on tonight's agenda the Board of Control met earlier today and approved nine items; three largest were Brewer-Garrett recreation center and city hall HVAC maintenance agreement year three of a 20-year contract in the amount of \$36,229.00. Second was DPN lawn maintenance for 2020 senior grass-cutting program amount \$27,760 and third largest was Legend Lawn Care for the 2020 senior grass cutting program in the amount of \$26,438.00.

Legislative Committee – Chairman, Mencini:

Mr. Mencini reported the legislative committee has 11 items in committee, if anything is to be pulled out give a call.

Parks & Recreation Committee – Chairman, Poindexter:

Mr. Poindexter reported the Parks & Recreation committee has nothing on tonight's agenda; nothing to report due to for all intense purposes the recreation center being closed until further notice.

Planning Committee – Chairman, Orcutt:

Mr. Orcutt reported the Planning Commission has nothing on tonight's agenda and has not met since last report. Mr. Orcutt thanked all essential workers' in Brook Park and hospital staff as well as Mrs. Schmuck for all their hard work.

Reports from standing committees: cont.**Safety Committee – Chairman, Troyer:**

Mr. Troyer reported the Safety Committee has nothing on tonight's agenda and nothing in committee to date. Mr. Troyer stated speaking with both the fire and police chiefs; the fire chief responded with the following information: As of May 5th the fire department has responded to 1,133 emergency calls, 30 more calls than the same time last year. Crews are currently running three advanced life-support ambulances and one ALS chase vehicle and jump-staffing number one engine and ladder. Over the last month 25% to 40% transported patients fit the COVID potential profile; fire personnel have additional training daily due to constantly changing COVID protocols and guidelines. After the transport of any patient firefighters clean and sanitize the ambulance using chlorine-dioxide and moonbeam from the ultra-violet light recently purchased, adding an additional 15 to 20 minutes per run. The firefighters have also trained several other department personnel on how to use the device and the moonbeam. Firefighters received training from the company and in turn trained other departments on how to use. The fire department has received PPE (Professional Protection Equipment) from Cuyahoga County, Southwest General Hospital and purchased equipment on their own. There many things going as well as many changes having more issues and things to do in order to provide their services. The fire department would like to thank the (Neighborhood) Watch Group for the food, cookies, cake and car parade for firefighter appreciation day earlier.

Service Committee - Chairman, Salvatore:

Mr. Salvatore reported the Service committee has nothing on tonight's agenda and no report.

Board of Zoning Appeals Committee – Chairman, Mencini:

Mr. Mencini thanked the city's safety forces for their services, service workers' for doing jobs every day and also the everyday workers'.

Reports from Special Committees:**Southwest General Health Center – Trustee, Orcutt:**

Mr. Orcutt reported on May 1st non-essential procedures not requiring overnight stay resumed at the hospital. The next teleconference hospital board meeting will be held on Wednesday, May 6th at 6:00 p.m. with both myself and Councilman Salvatore attending.

Berea Board of Education Representative, Mencini:

Mr. Mencini reported (hard to understand) kindergarten signups for the 2020-2021 school year can be done on the school's website. Staff is hoping students will be going back to school in the fall. The plan for seniors' graduation class is the student going into the school auditorium, four at a time with no more than ten people. The student name will be called and diploma given with parents sitting in their vehicles; the unfortunate is no senior prom, hopefully there will be something down the road to resemble a prom.

Technology & Innovation Council Representative – Poindexter:

Mr. Poindexter reported the meeting for Wednesday, May 6th due to having no way to conduct the technology audit remotely must have in hand, hopefully a meeting can be held next month.

REPORTS FROM BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS:

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS OF COMMENDATION:

REPORTS AND COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR:

Mayor Gammella reported the city had a volunteer layoff at City Hall with a total of 14 employees from various departments taking the layoff, majority out of the service department. The layoff will be until July 31st in order for the city to see where we are at with the coronavirus and not knowing where the end is. All through this pandemic senior transportation and essential doctor visits has continued and will continue; as well as the senior grass cutting program. City hall is not open to the public but field calls daily and thank you to all city employees for the outstanding job they are doing and team players.

Questions to the Mayor:

Mr. Salvatore stated to Mayor Gammella with 14 employees taking the voluntary layoff how will the service department go forward with the service department. Is there a plan on how the city will move forward with short-staffing?

Mayor Gammella responded that was one of the issues because the city has been running lean everywhere and taking things day by day. There were other people who wanted to take the volunteer layoff and wasn't able to due to the city not letting that many people leave and some being in positions that someone needs to be there. The city has the opportunity to call these people back earlier if necessary and it will be tight not only in Brook Park but all over the United States.

Mr. Salvatore agree with Mayor Gammella and commented the city is lean in all departments but it appears the biggest layoff was in the service department. Is there anything in place to reestablish the bulk pickup?

Mayor Gammella responded those discussions are occurring right now, possibly a few weeks down the road, don't have an exact date right now. The bulk and yard waste drop-off on Saturdays is very successful to where hours may need to be extended.

Mr. Salvatore continued the service crews are doing a fantastic job and the Saturday bulk drop-off is amazing how many residents are exercising that option bringing items down there. One concern is as hard as the crews are working

instructed not to touch anything. Might be a good idea to have signs posted for the residents' informing them that service crews are instructed not to touch anything, at this time. Not because crews don't want to help but right now they can't assist residents'.

Mayor Gammella stated point well taken and will get on that tomorrow, good idea.
Questions to the Mayor: cont.

Mr. Mencini stated to Mayor Gammella (hard to understand) coming from the service garage this is the busy season for the service garage i.e. grass cutting, bulk pickup, sewer calls and parks and playgrounds and many other things. How is this all going to get done with crew shortage, what if someone gets hurt? Don't see how the service crews is going to get everything done with the recent layoffs.

Mayor Gammella responded concerns are noted.

Mr. Mencini continued with overgrown grass in three wards are those complaints still turned into the building department?

Mayor Gammella concurred.

Mr. Mencini asked Mayor Gammella if Home Days will be held?

Mayor Gammella responded no, most cities in the area have cancelled all summer activities.

Mr. Mencini continued have there been any cuts with the non-contractual employees?

Mayor Gammella responded there have been cuts everywhere and continue to be cuts. From day one I lead the example with two jobs of Mayor and safety director. We will do what needs to be done to keep this city running and protect residents; most important issue is keeping the population safe and that is what we are going to do.

Mr. Orcutt thanked Mayor Gammella for his report and hopes family is doing well. My question is at the last meeting the finance director gave projections how the layoffs would work and also discussed how the city would have to pay unemployment premiums. In addition, the city would be saving 15.6% with 14% being of the Ohio Pension and 1.6% for Medicare. With the 14 people taking the voluntary layoff what is the total savings?

Mayor Gammella responded due to virtual meetings, I don't have that information with me but will call you tomorrow with that answer.

Questions to the Mayor: cont.

Mr. Troyer asked Mr. Vecchio who cancelled the Caucus Prior to meeting?

Mr. Vecchio responded myself following Resolution No. 9-2020 unanimously passed by Council, due to COVID-19. There was nothing brought forward to the agenda.

Mr. Troyer continued just wanted a name. To Mayor Gammella the park on Sheldon and Christene was mowed nicely but the city-owned property on Burton looks like it has not been cut this year. Is there a reason to be in close proximity and not cut that property?

Mayor Gammella responded can't answer that I don't know. Those vacant lots probably cost the city \$2,000 a year each to mow. Will let the service director know to get on it.

Mr. Troyer continued to Mayor Gammella has there been any more discussion or input on the pool roof and walls; having the attorneys to set it up properly. Has anything progressed on that not only would this be a good time to do this but it needs to get done.

Mayor Gammella responded yes, I agree it definitely needs to be done but right now with the pandemic the city has more pressing issues. I think everybody I want to get that pool done and operating with the first step being fixing the roof and walls. There have been discussions with the attorney but with the recent situation it is progressing very slowly, that is on the radar and still being looked at. It will get done just a matter of when.

Mr. Poindexter stated Point of Clarification with nothing being on the Caucus Prior to agenda. I seem to recall from the last meeting there was a discussion item about the sale of property on tonight's agenda. We were going to invite the interested buyer of the properties.

Mr. Vecchio interjected Council received the email from the interested buyer who rescinded his offers.

Mr. Poindexter commented didn't receive the email, or may have overlooked it.

Mr. Scott asked Mayor Gammella is the city looking into relieving the long line and wait period on Saturdays for bulk and yard waste drop-off at the service garage. Last Saturday when taking some items down there was a 40-minute wait and when leaving there counted 24 vehicles in a single-file line and three vehicles sitting on Holland Road.

Questions to the Mayor: cont.

Mayor Gammella responded last Saturday was probably the warmest day in a long time and that will be alleviated by extending the hours, extra personnel plus separate the trucks with signs for bulk and yard waste.

Mr. Salvatore stated to Mayor Gammella the voluntary layoff is phase one running through July 31, 2020. Is there a plan in place for phase two? Also, hopefully once the governor opens up recreation to whatever capacity can be engaged in. Is there anything in place to bring people back quickly to get recreation programs up and running as quickly as possible.

Mayor Gammella responded that is precisely one of the reasons I kept people in recreation for as long as I did to be ready. When this started it was said May 1st there would be major league baseball so I assumed city leagues would be playing baseball, as well as the recreation director. The city was ready, however, that is not the case and will play when it comes. Obviously, can't play sports during the pandemic situation if the governor says no. To the second part of your question I hope there isn't a phase two, don't want to see a phase two but we don't know what can happen. New car sales were down 60%, that's enormous, and having an auto maker in the city if cars aren't being sold then engines aren't being made. These are extraordinary tough times, fortunately, the city has fund balances and will get through this.

Mr. Salvatore understands has there been any programs looked at that some workers could take a 50% layoff and work maybe 20 hours a week and receive compensation and still eligible for the stimulus package.

Mayor Gammella responded that was looked and talked at length with union representatives and attorney for two days with the turnout being it wouldn't work out. I do want to thank the unions for working with us during this time.

Mr. Salvatore commented would like to see a plan in place and be ready rather than recreation open and not be ready.

Mayor Gammella interjected we are ready, waiting for the green light.

Mr. Salvatore asked Mayor Gammella to share the plan.

Mr. Troyer asked Mayor Gammella after the layoffs how many employees will be left at the recreation center?

Mayor Gammella responded it depends if baseball, football, basketball is being played and how many people can be put into the recreation center at one time. Can anyone come or will there be social distancing with only ten people at a time;

will staff as necessary.

Mr. Troyer clarified the question up until July 31st how many employees will be at the recreation center?

Mayor Gammella reiterated will staff as necessary. If the governor says the recreation center can be opened on May 15th the recreation center will be staffed I full.

Mr. Troyer reiterated when this layoff takes effect how many employees will be left at the recreation center?

Mayor Gammella responded when the layoff takes effect there will be three; one maintenance person, deputy recreation director and recreation director.

Reports and Communications from departments, commissions and other public officials:

Law Director Horvath

Mrs. Horvath reported with the recent city's active civil litigation the Workmen Compensation case of Karen King Vs City of Brook Park was dismissed, leaving eight active cases. In this difficult time, we're working through and trying to resolve with courts going to telephonic hearings.

Questions to law director:

Mr. Salvatore asked Mrs. Horvath with having no Mayor's Court currently what is being done to try to move cases along?

Mrs. Horvath responded the next Mayor's Court is scheduled for May 18th with 93 cases on the docket. As of today we are trying to resolve the cases with no court appearances. Assistant Law Director Sackett and I spent three hours today calling and advising defendants of their charges and hopefully come up with a resolution. Today we had 20 cases and resolved 14 cases leaving six cases coming to court; with fines being paid online. That's the process being used to reduce the number of people coming to Mayor's court and will continue to use this method to try and narrow the May 18th docket.

Mr. Salvatore continued six cases is a remarkable number to reduce that low and congratulations. With the six cases coming to will they be in the Council Chambers/Mayor's Court under normal circumstances?

Mrs. Horvath responded that is being worked on now, obviously, we want to maintain social distancing and try to keep as few people as possible in the chambers. The thought is people coming to court can check and perhaps wait in

their cars until called or if there is a small enough group they could be sufficiently spaced in the chambers. There was discussion about whether or not when people do come in should they be wearing masks and if did not have one how would that be handled? That particular policy is still evolving and hope by May 18th there will be very few people coming to court.

Mr. Salvatore asked if there is anything in place to have the building professionally cleaned or sanitized after each court day?

Mrs. Horvath responded we aren't at that point to date and think that is a good consideration and something that should be up for discussion with the Mayor.

Mr. Orcutt thanked Mrs. Horvath for the productive meeting on Saturday and appreciate your time. Did you have time to speak with Council President Vecchio to come up with a way to meet safely for executive session?

Mrs. Horvath responded I did speak with Council President Vecchio and relayed some of the thoughts from our meeting. Mr. Vecchio indicated to me he would further explore Zoom if there is a possibility of functions to be used for executive session.

Mr. Orcutt continued looking forward to that especially with the important piece of legislation in committee regarding co-counsel and the earlier an executive session can be held the better.

Mr. Troyer stated to Mrs. Horvath not sure Council needs executive session for the co-counsel legislation. In my opinion, if this was broken down to hire per site or property I'd have no problem with the legislation; as long as it is not open-ended like the laws state. I think you were going to show pictures and I don't need pictures to see how bad the property is.

Mrs. Horvath responded I do believe an executive session is needed and am very reticent to discuss individual situations that would fall under this legislation in public. I indicted at the last meeting it's always a bad idea to name names, sort of speak. Even if we don't use the executive session for this particular topic sooner or later we will need to have executive sessions.

Mr. Troyer commented my understanding is you wanted to show some pictures and so forth and viewing pictures in your office now you're saying there's quite a bit more than that so an executive session is needed.

Reports and Communications from departments, commissions and other public officials: cont.**Finance Director Cingle**

Mr. Cingle reported the April monthly reports will be distributed in the next few days, any questions please contact. As far as Councilman Orcutt's question to the Mayor the projected cost-savings for the 14 individuals part of the voluntary layoff. This is only an estimate we don't have yet the unemployment statements for these individuals. So I'm working off projections based on a schedule received from the Department of Job and Family Services (JCSS). The estimated savings over the 13-week period is \$117,546 estimated savings. What I'm also working on is the cost for the unemployment for part-time recreation employees and am waiting from the State Unemployment office; once that information is received will be shared with Council. Looking at the income collections for April, 2020 the city collected \$1,769,687 versus April, 2019 the city collected \$2,503,435 with a variance difference is \$733,748 which is a 29.31% reduction comparison from April 2020 versus April, 2019. The city is seeing effects of the COVID-19 virus currently and as more information is received will be shared with Council.

Questions to the Finance Director:

Mr. Orcutt stated to Mr. Cingle that \$733,000 is a considerable amount of money and income tax collections have been extended to July 15th. Let's say not everyone can pay their taxes by July 15th due to losing job and not having the funds. What is the tax department's plan for extra fees or working with residents' for payment plans?

Mr. Cingle responded the department can put individual on a payment plan depending if they are currently on a plan or not. Getting closer to the date we'll see if there is any guidance from the state on the matter on how to handle state income tax. The tax department has offered payment plans in the past and would be one option come July 15th.

Mr. Mencini to Mr. Cingle not sure if you heard the governor's statement that at the start of the year the state will be \$7,777,000 in the arrears. My question is I hope the city doesn't rely too much on the state to get out of this, do you concur?

Mr. Cingle responded at a previous meeting I mentioned that the city needs to proceed through this with the thought that the city will not receive any assistance from both federal and state governments.

Mr. Mencini stated knowing this and knowing what you just stated and what Council did with the operating part of the budget. What do you foresee, to me, with some of the layoffs there is a need and how will the city get caught up? It's going to be tough correct?

Questions to the finance director: cont.

Mr. Cingle responded yes, it is going to be very difficult and think there are many approaches to this. One was the voluntary layoff, the Mayor speaking to the unions about not taking a pay increase this year. The city is looking at possibly coming back to Council to shift some capital dollars back into the operating side but are still a few months out from that. The city is trying to get out ahead as much as possible by being pro-active rather than reactive. I was on a call Friday with the Municipal Finance Officers from around the state and there are lot of projections that the true impact of the income tax losses until October 1st. The city will continue to monitor collections daily and advise Council but think there will be a few phases to this moving forward. This will be a collaborative effort with the administration, unions and City Council to work through this. I personally think that this could linger on into 2021, hopefully not longer than that but still concerned with the occasional entrant rule and the impact it may possibly have on the City of Brook Park, we're in for a long haul, unfortunately in my opinion.

Mr. Salvatore stated to Mr. Cingle the estimated savings from the voluntary layoff is \$117,546 correct.

Mr. Cingle concurred and mentioned that's only an estimate.

Mr. Salvatore continued that doesn't include any contributions towards unemployment?

Mr. Cingle interjected yes it does. Based on the schedule received from the JFS the city has an estimated what we believe each individual will get per week from the state.

Mr. Salvatore commented the \$117,546 is a true figure the city won't have to pay towards contributions of unemployment out of that figure, which reduces the amount of true savings.

Mr. Cingle continued the amount that the city is projected to pay to the state for the unemployment monies of the affected personnel receive weekly is calculated in that \$117,546 figure. The projection currently is the state would pay a little over \$87,000 for these 14 individuals. Then the part-time individuals at the recreation center that information is starting to come in now so that \$117,546 figure will decrease because the city will pay unemployment costs for laid-off part time workers at the recreation center. There is a savings there as well because the city hasn't been paying them and that will be calculated as well.

Mr. Salvatore commented the \$117,546 projection will be less than that figure.

Mr. Cingle interjected that amount the city is projecting to pay to the state is

reducing the savings. To walk through the cost-savings we're projecting the wages to be \$180,430 and there is a savings of 14% on pension which is \$25,260. The city is also saving on the employer's Medicare portion about of about \$2,616 and also the city won't be collecting 2% city income tax which reduces the savings by about \$3,600. So that money is paid through state unemployment is part of the calculations in the total savings.

Mr. Salvatore commented by doing this temporary layoff the city is looking at a true cost-savings of \$117,000.

Mr. Cingle concurred and stated that is the current estimate until the unemployment information is received which should be received within the next few weeks. Then these figures can be firmed up and also work on the recreation side due to not collecting receipts but we're not paying the part-timers but will be paying unemployment for some of them which will reduce that \$117,546 savings.

Mr. Troyer stated to Mr. Cingle on the layoff savings that is through July, correct.

Mr. Cingle concurred and mentioned through July 31st.

Mr. Troyer continued what the city has to pay is based on the old formula, before the weekly \$600.00 from the federal government.

Mr. Cingle responded no, the city is not paying the \$600.00.

Mr. Troyer asked Mr. Cingle if there are numbers for the year-to-date for revenues?

Mr. Cingle clarified for all revenues or income tax?

Mr. Troyer responded income tax.

Mr. Cingle responded it might take a minute if you want to call me tomorrow I can give that information.

Mr. Troyer commented it's hard to get a good number comparing April, 2019 versus April, 2020 because the filing deadline has been extended; those payments would have showed up last year but not this year. I would like the whole year with May be very telling.

Mr. Cingle agreed with Mr. Troyer with May, June and July will be rough months. Looking at my computer total income tax collections from January through April 30, 2020 the amount is \$7,159,015 and for the same period in 2019 the amount is \$7,522,625. I will look at these numbers deeper to ascertain how these numbers

are related to the filing deadline being pushed out to July 15th and what is believed lost revenue.

Mr. Vecchio stated to Mr. Cingle at the last meeting the projections were about 20% starting point then gradual decrease. It looks like the city is hitting higher at the 29.1%, is that the consensus for all communities.

Mr. Cingle responded on last weeks' conference call the Regional Income Tax (RITA) stated their collections were down 32.5%. Using that as a gauge makes it little better than what RITA shows with the communities they collect income taxes. Unfortunately, time will tell and that's why the city is trying to get ahead on this working off these projections with being one month in the rears; trying to get as much savings as possible currently, to not go deeper moving forward. These are all projections and will take time to work through.

still be interested in the property, so if there is something that can be renegotiated I'm all ears. Won't defeat legislation that has been issued a number the gentleman was asked to attend a meeting and if there is any discussion then I think Council should do that. If it's over, then it comes out of committee to be defeated.

Mr. Orcutt stated to Mayor Gammella hopes the administration can work with the interested buyer to reconsider his offer to get this going again, as stated last week in favor of putting home on those vacant lots.

Mayor Gammella commented can't put homes on empty lots if the city can't sell them.

Mr. Orcutt continued I read the email that the interested buyer didn't want to negotiate that price and didn't have any issues with. Just thought you could work with Council and the buyer.

Mayor Gammella continued we will continue to do so but again having new houses built must sell the properties.

Mr. Orcutt continued the interested buyer sent the email while the meeting was still in progress last week, hopefully that is something that can be worked on.

Mayor Gammella responded we will, thank you.

Mr. Mencini reiterated a statement from last week about having directors at meetings; maybe the economic development commissioner could give an update.
