Mr. Poindexter stated no report.

Finance Committee - Chairman, Scott

Mr. Scott reported the Finance committee has nothing on tonight's agenda. The Board of Control met earlier today there were 23 items on the agenda with the three largest being petroleum \$40,000.00; Signal Service for maintenance of traffic signals \$40,000,00 and specialized crack-sealing \$149,792.92. Also approved was an awarded contract for the Middlebrook reconstruction project for \$307,400.50 and Delores Blvd. phase 2 \$449,419.00.

Legislative Committee - Chairwoman, Coyne

Madam Coyne reported nothing on the agenda and requested that the HMAP legislation be placed on next week's Caucus agenda.

Parks & Recreation Committee - Chairman, Mencini

Mr. Mencini reported baseball and softball are in the third week; a blood drive will be held at the recreation center on June 30th from 1:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m.; the Golden Gloves will be on June 17th and 18th and the water park is open daily from 11:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

Reports of standing committees:

Planning Committee - Chairman, Troyer

Mr. Troyer reported there is a request for approval to construct a new billboard for Park N Fly that was tabled due to they may be changing the configurations. A request for approval for a conditional use permit and site plan for a full service car wash for Sargent Clean Car Wash at 5764 West 130th that was not approved. There were several requests for approvals for a Senior Spry Medical Center at 14070 Snow Road that were approved. The tabled items are a proposed lot split at 14070 and 14080 Brookpark Road, there are two dealerships with one staying and one closed that will bring a new business into the city.

Mr. Roberts reported safety committee has nothing on tonight's agenda.

Service Committee - Chairman, Poindexter

Mr. Poindexter reported there are two items on tonight's agenda and there is no legislation in committee.

Board of Zoning Appeals - Chairman, Salvatore

Mr. Salvatore reported the board of zoning met last night with two items on the agenda; one for a variance for a fence on Sheldon Road that was tabled and a sign variance for Park N Fly that was tabled due to changes.

REPORTS OF SPECIAL COMMITTEES:

Southwest General Health Center Trustee, Mencini.

Mr. Mencini reported the month of May Southwest celebrated National Nurses Week and also National Hospital Week. Over the past month for COVID-19 Southwest had 13 patients per day and up to 17 patients, within the past two weeks. Critical Care has been very low and the hospital has protective care equipment for anyone that needs it.

Berea Board of Education Representative, Coyne.

Madam Coyne reported with the recent school shooting again Superintendent Wheeler sent out an unfortunate email about safety. Think police should be present at front and back doors of all elementary and middle schools and the safety resource officer at the high school. Received several complaints asking why the high school commencement was not held at Baldwin-Wallace. For the first time, the commencement was held outside of the high school with only four tickets being provided per child. The event was livestreamed but was very difficult for home viewers. The school board has called a special meeting for June 13th and I will be in attendance.

Technology & Innovation Council Representative, Poindexter.

Mr. Poindexter reported the Technology & Innovation is status quo and the next meeting will be held on Wednesday, June 15th at 6:00 p.m.

REPORTS AND COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR:

Mayor Orcutt reported he recently met with Berea Superintendent Wheeler, Berea Mayor Kleem and Middleburg Heights Mayor Castelli to discuss the issues of safety in the schools. Upcoming meetings with the resource officers will be held at individual schools to discuss school safety. Brook Park hosted a meeting with Hopkins Airport Director, Robert Kennedy, to discuss the phase three entrance and exit ramps leading to the airport and also the possibility of elevated ramps along Snow Road. As Mr. Troyer mentioned the Spry senior medical center in cooperation with MetroHealth will be moving into the former post office location on Snow Road to help seniors thrive while receiving health care. Mayor Orcutt welcomed two new firefighters and congratulated and thanked Mr. Holesovsky for all he does for the recreation center and this community.

Questions:

Madam Coyne asked Mayor Orcutt that she and patrol officer Sensel are working on school issues and would like to know if they could attend the upcoming safety meetings or meet with the Mayor afterwards.

Mayor Orcutt suggested Madam Coyne to call Superintendent Wheeler, who is having two meetings, one with many people in attendance and one small meeting.

Mr. Mencini stated to Mayor Orcutt good to hear with the senior medical center coming to Snow Road. Thanked Mayor Orcutt for the fireworks legislation, don't want to take anything away but need to be proactive before something happens. Where is the city at with the Hookah shops seeing the sign going up at Holland and Engle Roads? I'm not against new business coming to the city but what has to be done so they're not on corners or down the street from the schools. Want

good businesses that want to be profitable but Engle Road is a strong secondary street in this city, so where are we at?

Mayor Orcutt responded bringing MetroHealth to the city was a big success and thanked the city's economic development commissioner for all his hard work. This will bring eight or nine jobs and will have a place for seniors to congregate while receiving primary health care. With the Hookah lounges and/or vape shops many of that was in place by the former administration and think we have to collectively work together. My executive assistant and I are working with the law department on restrictions and use of the zoning map for certain areas; there is one that went in and need to check whether it is in the right zone.

Mr. Mencini continued to Mayor Orcutt I like first statement of working with Council. Residents want to be that city and we are working for a lot of things that we want to have here and not sure that's where our residents want to go. I'm sure they are great business people and not faulting you.

Mr. Roberts asked for a meeting with Mayor Orcutt to discuss issues on a street in Ward 3, the residents would like some help.

Mayor Orcutt responded the law department is already involved and had one person in court for issues and are also working with the building department. There has been a lot of progress the last two days between the law department and Mayor's office on those issues.

Mr. Troyer asked with the airport meeting is that at city hall and is it a public meeting?

Mayor Orcutt responded it is not a public meeting.

Mr. Troyer continued with the corner house on Holland residents have commented that things are happening after so many years. Is there any update of the roof and walls at the recreation center?

Mayor Orcutt responded we are working with the law department to bring legislation forward to repair the roof and walls.

Mr. Poindexter asked what is the cut-off date for the grass cutting and snow plowing senior services?

Mayor Orcutt responded had meetings with the contractors about a month ago or longer.

Questions to the Mayor: cont.

Mr. Poindexter continued in a recent email I sent there is a gentleman in his 80s that is having medical issues and recently lost his wife and is no longer able to care for his yard. Why can't residents be eligible for these programs after the deadline date?

Mayor Orcutt responded the programs close so the contractors can make up their schedules for the year.

Mr. Poindexter interjected this resident has been cited for grass that he is unable to do himself and not able to get help due to missing the deadline.

Mayor Orcutt responded I spoke with the gentleman who was on the program before and left due to not being satisfied. This gentleman is back on the program and a neighbor cut his grass. One contractor was let go due to not providing the proper services to residents.

Mr. Poindexter stated if this comes up in the future with one person he would like to see people being added, after the fact, especially in extreme circumstances.

Mayor Orcutt stated that could possibly be worked out with the contractors.

Mr. Poindexter asked if the meeting with Mayor Orcutt and airport director is private.

Mayor Orcutt responded it is private requested by the airport director to meet.

Mr. Poindexter asked Mayor Orcutt to insure a question is asked that whatever is being planned incorporates the Forward Innovation property not being cut off on access from Snow Road.

Mayor Orcutt responded Forward Innovation personnel will be in attendance.

REPORTS AND COMMUNICATIONS FROM DEPARTMENTS, COMMISSIONS, AND OTHER PUBLIC OFFICIALS:

Recreation Director Gonzales

Mr. Gonzales reported the first adaptive program for people with special needs is scheduled for June 18th from 10:30 a.m. to 12:00 p.m., can register online or in person, very excited for this program. The Home Days celebration will be held on July 9th and 10th and are switching locations to the amphitheater and parking lot; with concerts being held at the amphitheater and fireworks on Sunday night at 10:00 p.m. The Home Days parade is returning after a few years off and will be on Sunday, July 10th at 1:00 p.m., registrations are available at the recreation center. As Mr. Mencini mentioned the water park is open daily from 10:00 a.m.

Reports and communication from other departments, commissions and other public officials: cont.

to 6:00 p.m. For the water park to open it must be 70 degrees or above with no threat of bad weather.

Service Director Beyer

Mr. Beyer reported that next week is bulk pickup on regular rubbish days; bulk items consist of dressers, mattresses, box springs and televisions. Cardboard is not considered a bulk item and can be dropped off at any green or yellow container located throughout the city. The Vactor and street sweeper have been out and Mr. Beyer asked for motorists to be careful when coming up on a work zone. There was an extensive water main break on Sheldon Road that Cleveland Water repaired and the road has been reopened. The Grayfriar cul-de-sac project has started with crews pouring 90-yards of concrete.

Engineer Piatak

Mr. Piatak reported the Middlebrook and Delores Boulevard projects were approved by the Board of Control earlier and will be moving forward. The Hio Drive project bid process started today with bids being opened on June 21st at city hall at 10:00 a.m. Both the Delores and Middlebrook projects came in lower than estimated and am hoping that the Hio Drive project does the same. At the Caucus Prior to meeting earlier I was remiss in stating that the city's economic commissioner and I met with EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) representatives to see if there are any funding assistance for the water main project on Sheldon Road. The administration is also looking at other funding resources that may be available for this project and other city projects. Law Director Horvath

Mrs. Horvath reported that Council should have received the Active Civil litigation list with two new cases listed. First case is Bernath vs. City of Brook Park which is an appeal to Common Pleas Court for a Workmen's' Compensation ruling. The second case is an Asbury vs City of Brook Park which is also an appeal of a recent

Board of Zoning denial.

Finance Director Cingle

Mr. Cingle reported that the 2021 audit continues with no further updates. The 2023 tax budget is being finalized and forthcoming to City Council. To date, the tax refunds total \$1,202,391.00 and of that amount the Work from Home totals \$1,104,636.00.

Questions:

Mr. Mencini stated to Mr. Cingle when speaking of the \$1.2 million-dollars, how many returns?

Questions to the directors: cont.

Mr. Cingle responded 645 refund requests have been processed.

Mr. Mencini thanked Mr. Gonzales for the recent conversation covered a lot. Home Days is only Saturday and Sunday, no Friday?

Mr. Gonzales concurred.

Mr. Mencini asked Mrs. Horvath is the new legislation discussed for concealed weapons coming forward; especially since Madam Coyne mentioned school safety and Superintendent Wheeler having meetings.

Mrs. Horvath responded not sure if it came over to the Council office there have been many absences in law dept.

Mr. Mencini continued that was brought forward two months ago and told the police it was coming and it looks like grandstanding.

Mr. Salvatore stated to Mr. Cingle with the refunds I'm assuming the bulk of those are coming from NASA?

Mr. Cingle concurred.

Mr. Salvatore asked if the return has increased.

Mr. Cingle responded no.

Mr. Troyer asked Mr. Cingle how many refund requests have been received from working from home?

Mr. Cingle responded will provide that information, don't have it with me.

Mr. Troyer asked Mr. Cingle how many employees are there at NASA?

Mr. Cingle responded 1,500 civil service and 1,500 contractors.

Mr. Troyer asked Mrs. Horvath with the active civil list number five that was the addition to the garage?

Mrs. Horvath concurred.

Mr. Troyer asked Mr. Piatak if there is a chance of a grant for a bike lane for the Sheldon Road, putting one on Smith Road helped with funding.

Questions to the directors: cont.

Mr. Piatak responded not that I'm aware of, for a resurfacing project because the local share is minimal with both the county and NOACA picking up most of the costs, this project being shared with Middleburg Heights.

Mr. Troyer stated to Mr. Beyer thank the crews for the great job on Wedgewood. That kind of work was not normally done in the past mostly contracted out and now doing in-house.

Mr. Beyer responded that was a big overlay that has to go in process. Could have went with a contractor but when put forward to the city foremen and employees, they did a great job.

Mr. Troyer stated there is a leak on the other side probably coming from the shutoff?

Mr. Beyer responded that has been called in and hope they get to it before it gets worse because that's how the first one started.

Mr. Troyer stated a valve shut off, thank the guys for the great job on Grayfriar. Sent memos about voids on city street that need repairs.

Mr. Beyer asked for clarification of voids?

Mr. Troyer responded potholes and things that are not normal when driving down a street.

Mr. Beyer responded to date service crews have went through 90-tons of asphalt and will continue to have crews doing the roads.

Mr. Troyer stated I do tell residents crews are coming and that city can do better repairs than in the past. Appreciate what the crews do with the water main break and the big job getting done on a holiday weekend.

Mr. Troyer stated to Mr. Gonzales not up to date on how sports teams work but the team I had wasn't that good last year and this year it's the same team. I was told the team doesn't have a pitcher is that normal? This concerns me that the score was 17-0.

Mr. Gonzales responded that child may have requested to move to a specific team due to not having a good experience, requested not to go back. The recreation staff tries to divide teams as even as possible and has everything in the past from assessments to drafts to control the teams. Recreation center does not stack teams by any means and tries to make as even as possible.

Questions to the directors: cont.

Mr. Troyer mentioned it's not about winning but wanting the kids to enjoy.

Mr. Gonzales commented nobody wants them to have a good experience more than the recreation center staff.

Mr. Vecchio stated to Mr. Beyer with monthly bulk pickup being a debacle in the city with dates, I saw items out tonight on my way to meeting. Other cities I have traveled through have bulk pickup signs moved into zones each month informing residents it is bulk pickup week. Is that something that can be considered?

Mr. Beyer responded that could be explored and as stated bulk pickup is the second full week of the month and signs would have to be sporadic throughout the city, I don't think that will curtail the problem though.

Mr. Vecchio stated possibly reduce the stresses of nine people picking up of the items.
