The meeting was called to order by Council President Vecchio at 7:43 p.m., the clerk called the roll and the following Members of Council answered:

Aviation & Environmental Committee – Chairman, Poindexter

Mr. Poindexter stated there is no legislation, therefore, no report.

Finance Committee - Chairman, Scott

Mr. Scott reported Finance committee has nothing on tonight's agenda. The Board of Control met earlier with ten (10) items on the agenda; three largest being is an increase for three police officer uniforms at \$1,800.00 each = \$5,400.00; Jerseys and Basketballs - \$7,039.85 and 2023 Solid Waste mailing - \$6,735.00.

Legislative Committee - Chairwoman, Coyne

Madam Coyne reported there are two pieces of legislation on tonight's agenda for medical marijuana.

Parks & Recreation Committee - Chairman, Mencini

Mr. Mencini reported last weekend for Flag Titans football teams. On Wednesdays Pickle ball program is held from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. November 25th will be the holiday parade at 6:00 p.m., lighting ceremony to follow. November 26th Santa Tours the city and on Sunday, November 27th the pancake breakfast.

Planning Committee - Chairman, Troyer

Mr. Troyer reported there are two items on agenda. Just a reminder October is Breast Cancer Awareness month, get your checkups.

Safety Committee - Chairman, Roberts

Mr. Roberts stated no report.

Service Committee - Chairman, Poindexter

Mr. Poindexter stated no items in committee, therefore, no report.

Board of Zoning Appeals - Chairman, Salvatore

Mr. Salvatore stated no report.

**REPORTS OF SPECIAL COMMITTEES:****Southwest General Health Center Trustee, Mencini**

Mr. Mencini with the Cleveland clinic coming to the former Kmart location at the corner of Bagley and Engle Roads; Southwest was asked to join and chose not to. Southwest is a high-function hospital with low costs to the patients. Southwest has locations in many communities, Medina, Strongsville, Olmsted Falls and plans for a location in North Royalton. In-patient volumes are down and out-patient volumes are up which is occurring with many hospitals. The new Olmsted Falls location is picking up volume.

**Berea Board of Education Representative, Coyne**

Madam Coyne reported there was a meeting last night and the district signed a contract with Southwest General for the display of signage at the district's sports facility; Southwest is responsible for the upkeep and signage. Something new with Camp Mi-Bro-Be is students will have a longer weekend without missing classes. Lastly, the district is recognizing Girls Varsity Wrestling as a sport.

**Technology & Innovation Council Representative, Poindexter**

Mr. Poindexter reported the committee met on October 5th and will be presenting to Council new website RFP's sometime in November. Resumes are being received showing interest to join the committee with the Mayor making the call to fill the vacancy. With the EV (electronic vehicles) charging system installations the city is assured on receiving one and installation starts in October, 2022 and continues into 2023.

**REPORTS OF BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS:****INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS OF COMMENDATION:****REPORTS AND COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR:**

Mayor Orcutt extended condolences to Finance Director Cingle and family on the passing of his father. This evening legislation will be introduced relating to the shortage of concrete. Super 8 motel update the fire and police departments have been training at the vacant hotel and demolition is scheduled for October 24th. On October 13th, the city applied for funds from the American Rescue Act from Cuyahoga County in the amount of \$1.5 million-dollars and want to thank Council with all their help with that. If legislation is passed this evening for the library resurfacing project that work will begin on October 24th, traffic will be rerouted.

**Questions:**

Mr. Mencini asked if there are any plans to meet about roads?

Mayor Orcutt responded yes, would like to sit with Council at city hall to have those discussions. Both the service director and engineer have come up with new ideas for an alternative roads program from past years, due to the shortage of concrete. Something creative to find out what the best streets can be done with asphalt that have low sub-

base damage; important to have those discussions in order to get those roads in the budget.

Mr. Mencini continued would like to meet regarding overnight parking issues, speeding, dog barking and livestream complaints being received.

Mayor Orcutt responded with the overnight parking issues send a work order to my administrative assistant with the location so special attention can be given to the area. Speeding is a big issue and don't know why it's picked up the last few years; the electronic trailer is being placed throughout the city to create a safer city for the residents.

Mr. Mencini stated responses are being received from the departments.

Mayor Orcutt continued Council is the liaison between the residents and administrative. Work orders are being turned in with responses being received; seems the system is working.

Mr. Troyer mentioned last week would like to meet with the safety director on overnight parking problem; seems like dispatch is giving permission to park overnight.

Mayor Orcutt responded first I'm hearing of this and that can be looked into. Reiterated if there is an area send the work order for special attention to be given.

Mr. Troyer asked for any updates on the roof and walls?

Mayor Orcutt responded legislation will be forthcoming to go out to bid with the only payment on the city is for advertising. On the finance portion there is \$1.8 million-dollars in the budget and have found out that Nopec will lend the city \$1 million-dollars with three-percent (3%) interest for ten (10) years. Other funds needed will come from possible bonding or possibly leftover monies from other funds.

Mr. Roberts stated there were issues with overnight parking, work order was sent and with a response the next morning at 8:00 a.m., the matter was resolved.

Mr. Poindexter stated at the last meeting Brewer-Garrett provided conflicting reports from Construction Resources on the roof study; any update on when the meeting of both parties will occur?

Mayor Orcutt responded research done by the city has concluded the facts that a study paid for on the existing roof that is polyurethane foam and was told from an

inspector that this is not for that region. Checked out that this roof material is used throughout the region and was conflicting with Construction Resources report. What ended up happening is some saw-cuts were too large and weren't up compromising those areas with water. There is a \$5 million-dollar estimate for a brand new roof to be put on. The other thing found is Brewer-Garrett does have a warranty with West Roofing who have made repairs and thanked both the recreation and service directors for working with this company, still some areas that need corrections. Would like to take you on the roof as well as the service and recreation directors on the roof to show what is occurring. Candidly speaking, the city paid to have the roof inspected and opened those big areas that weren't closed correctly and will work with Construction Resources to make that right.

Mr. Poindexter continued don't understand the conflicting reports of one company saying it's good and the other company saying not good, that are both experts. Meeting should take place with your administration.

Mayor Orcutt responded if you want that, I can do that.

Mayor Orcutt commented both companies are trying to protect their reputation.

Mr. Poindexter stated a roof done five years ago but still has concerns with one company saying it's good and other company saying no good.

Mayor Orcutt stated there are some areas that are pooling and the city has been assured will be taken out and repaired. Doing a walk-through with the contractor there were other things pointed out that the city wasn't aware of. West Roofing must be notified anytime the roof is opened up; if not done that compromises the warrant and will not walk away.

Mr. Troyer stated would like to be on the tour of the roof, many leaks in both the chambers and offices have been there.

Mr. Vecchio expressed condolences to Finance Director Cingle's family on the passing of his father and stated there will be no report from the finance director.

Mr. Sensel reported the fire department for the last two days has been training at the Super 8 hotel as well as the Cuyahoga County Sherriff Swat Team having training tomorrow using explosive breaching tools making loud noises.

Recreation Director Gonzales

Mr. Gonzales stated the Boo Park fall festival was a huge success with 1,500 to 2,000 participants, thanked everyone involved. Basketball and cheerleading registrations will continue until October 31st. As mentioned there are many holiday events coming up in November, will have more details to follow.

Service Director Beyer

Mr. Beyer reported a successful Shred-It day event with four (4) tons of documents shredded, thanked the service team and residents. With last week's bulk 69 tons were picked up. The service yard will close on November 18th for drop off of yard waste and rubbish during the week. The service yard will be open on Saturdays from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. Leaf collection will continue and one tour of the city has been completed and reminded residents not to park in front of leaf piles, telephone poles or signs. If there are any sticks, stones or dog wastes in the leaf piles there will be no pickup.

Engineer Piatak

Mr. Piatak reported the CSX ditch-cleaning project on Michael and Westbrook all the paperwork has been submitted to the railroad, waiting response. With the Delores Blvd. road project concrete work has been completed with landscaping wrapping up this afternoon. With the Hio Road project concrete was poured on the northbound lanes yesterday and following up with driveway aprons this week. As mentioned with the Super 8 hotel anticipating moving forward on that project.

Madam Coyne stated this for me is the residents' deserve the best library and this lease leads to continual insufficient revenue for the library to finance the city's parking lot. The City of Middleburg Hts. built a new library and reused the former building for a police station. Think this could be a short-term lease and possibly find a new location on the city campus. With Brook Park Memorial propose having an adaptive use don't want another vacant building and think this should be considered before tearing down the former school.

Mr. Poindexter stated 'Point of Clarification' this legislation is for the parking lot; not the lease agreement with the library.

Madam Coyne reiterated perhaps lessening the lease.

Mr. Poindexter stated is the city lessens the lease the library may explore other options this is in the city's best interest for residents to have a library to use for 25 years.

Mayor Orcutt stated this agreement is no different than past agreements between the city and the library; and an important asset. When looking at Middleburg Hts. you have to look into the assessments with the property tax and revenue stream versus Brook Park.

Madam Coyne reiterated that Middleburg Hts. has an adaptive reuse of the old library to a police station. Propose engaging in a professional planner for adaptive use of Brook Park Memorial.
